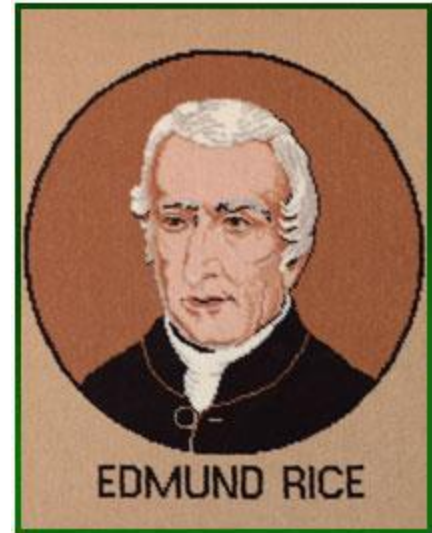


ABOUT RICE
